A Spotlight on Sleep

As we pull toward the end of term, I want to shine a spotlight on sleep! Importantly, the importance of quality and appropriate quantity of sleep for children is incredibly beneficial. It enhances memory retention, allowing students to absorb and recall information more effectively. It also plays a critical role in regulating mood and managing stress, helping students to remain more focused and engaged during school hours.

Why is sleep important?

Sleep restores children physically. It helps them learn and remember things, and it boosts immunity. And sleep helps children grow. For example, children's bodies produce growth hormone when they're asleep. Children of all ages need to get **enough sleep so they can play, learn and concentrate** during the day.

School-age children: when and how much they sleep

Children aged 5-11 years need 9-11 hours of sleep a night.

Children over 5 years of age rarely nap during the day. If your child often needs daytime naps, it's good to check they're getting enough sleep overnight. See your GP if you have concerns. Primary school-age children are usually tired after school and might look forward to bedtime from about 7.30 pm.

Teenagers: when and how much they sleep Children entering puberty generally need about **8-10 hours of sleep** a night.

Changes to the <u>circadian rhythm</u> during adolescence mean it's normal for teenagers to want to go to bed later at night – often around 11 pm or later – then get up later in the morning. Good daytime habits and sleep environment habits can help teenagers get enough sleep.

Over 90% of adolescent children don't get the recommended amount of sleep on school nights. Getting enough good-quality sleep is important during this period, because sleep is vital for thinking, learning and concentration skills. Lack of sleep in these years has also been linked to mental health conditions like depression and anxiety.

School Council Snapshot from the 22nd May 2024

Student Representatives Report

Flynn informed council about the SRC the students' experiences since the last meeting. Students enjoyed the poetry expo and having family and friends attend, they are now enjoying informative writing as they can share the things, they have a special interest in. Electives have been popular, and the students are glad they have returned for term 2. Flynn also informed council about the latest two excursions for the Grade 5 & 6 students. He recognised the efforts of several students who had success at the district cross country and will compete at the next level and spoke about the Landcare visit to Cannibal Creek where they learned to identify native plants and their uses.

Annual Implementation Plan 2024

The School Strategic plan and annual implementation plan are in the consultation stage. A forum for community consultation will be held on Wednesday the 5th of June with nibbles provided. This is currently advertised on Compass.

Finance:

The Finance committee reported on the sound position for March & April 2024. The purpose for fundraising for 2024 was discussed with the decision made to fund further playground improvements. The profit from fundraising to the end of April was \$1,674.86. The confirmed cash budget was presented and passed. Council approved the procurement of a concrete paths to the shed and around the bike shed to the proposed new bus gate, painting of two classrooms buildings, and the school funded items for the inclusive playground. Discussion about plans for a library and book upgrade were also had.

Policies

The following policies were tabled.

• Sunsmart Policy 2024.

Excursions, Camps and Activities:

- **EDEC Lightning Premiership, June 12th,** at Worrell Reserve and Pepi's land Emerald for grade 5 & 6 students at a cost of \$10 per student
- **Grade 5 & 6 Life Education sessions, June 27th,** at a cost of \$20 per student for the Grade 5 session and \$36 per student for the longer Grade 6 session.
- **Performing Arts Production** at EPAC on the in the last week of term 3 with the date to be confirmed at a cost of \$12.00 per seat.
- **The Ecowarriors** have two planting sessions in Gembrook Park with the local Landcare team on the 23rd and 30th of May.
- Grade 5 & 6 Landcare Caring for Country excursions, May 16th & June 20th, provided by the Westernport Landcare network and the Parks Victoria Innovation Fund 2024.

Fundraising

Term 3 Fundraising was discussed

Trivia Night, August 16th, with \$10 entry fee and a silent auction

Special Friends Day, August 26th. The PFA will sell plates of cakes/sweets for \$4-\$6, and a cup of tea or coffee for \$2.

Fathers Day Stall, August 29th and 30th. Prices are between 50c and \$15.

Buildings and Grounds:

The Inclusive playground grant works still have one more line marking activity to be painted.

The school-raised funds components of the inclusive playground will be:

- Cubby
- Sunlight Arbour
- Rubber Lizard
- Babel Drum
- 3 additional toadstool seats
- The Rolling Facilities Evaluation report has been received. This report details the maintenance activities the school must address over the next 5 years and is the basis of maintenance funding from the Department of Education.
- Tree works will be carried out starting next Monday 27th of May. Mostly this is dead wood and pruning with a small straggly dying blackwood and the dead prunus being removed from the junior playground.
- The school is working with Region and VSBA to address issues with the storm water drainage at the rear of the school, upgrades to the roof safety systems, upgrades to the fire hydrant system and rectification to the solar panel system.

Occupational Health and Safety:

The school underwent an OHS assurance assessment on Monday the 6th of May. The school had a rating of 90.67% and the staff are to be congratulated on upholding this high standard.

Landcare Grant

The school has received a grant for \$1,000 from the Woolworths Junior Landcare scheme to establish a Yarning Circle. The plan is in the early stage of consultation.

Grade 6 T-Shirt suggestion

A parent has raised the idea of a Grade 6 t-shirt to suit warm weather. No commitment has been made towards this idea yet. Before the next meeting School Council will investigate the cost to parents of a year 6 shirt, the lead time for an order and the cost of an iron on motif which could be used on a student's existing school uniform shirt. Council agreed that the Grade 6 jacket will remain as a subsidised uniform item.

As always, we welcome any new members to join our School Council. We meet approximately twice per term and appreciate all contributions to our school community.

What is Smile Squad?


The Victorian Government free school dental program – Smile Squad – is visiting this school soon.




